### A CALL TO SERVICE

It's November already?! It's time to start thinking about Thanksgiving and—oh, yes—Christmas! People of all ages seem to come alive and invigorate at this time of year. There are, however, a couple of other days in November that some of us, unfortunately, tend to overlook. Those days are Election Day and Veterans Day. Election Day has come and gone. Let's not let the same thing happen this Veterans Day without thanking those who proudly and courageously served this country.

Veterans Day is Monday, November 11, 2024. It is a federal holiday set aside to honor military veterans. I learned something I didn't know about Veterans Day. The World War I armistice between the Allied Nations and Germany went into effect on the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month. As a result, Veterans Day is celebrated on November 11<sup>th</sup>, regardless of the day of the week on which the 11<sup>th</sup> falls.



## HOT TOPIC: Neighborhood Safety

#### **Exterior of your home**

- KEEP YOUR YARD WELL MAINTAINED Bushes should be trimmed lower than three feet or below windows.
- Tree branches should be trimmed higher than six feet.
- Landscaping should not create blind spots or hiding places. Walkways and landscaping should "direct" visitors to the proper Entrance and away from private areas.
- Address numbers should be placed in obvious places, not hidden under landscaping and should be well lit during the night hours.
- Motion sensors lighting can be used Alongside bedroom areas, front entryways and strategically placed around other zones of the home.
- KNOW THE PEOPLE IN YOUR NEIGHBOR-HOOD-LOOK OUT FOR ONE ANOTHER- Talk with your neighbors about suspicious activity in your neighborhood.
- Do not be afraid to call the police for your neighbor if something seems suspicious.

#### **Doors**

- All exterior doors should be constructed of steel or aluminum alloy, solid-core hard wood or be impact-resistant. All glass doors should have impact resistant glass.
- Install deadbolts on all ground level doors.
- Install an alarm if you do not already have one
- All secondary doors should have a secondary deadbolt lock.
- Sliding doors can be secured by using dowels; laced in the interior tracks, pin locks, kick planes and/or auxiliary locks.

 View finders should be installed in front doors to allow 180-degree view.

#### Garage

- Secure side doors and windows just like the other areas of your home.
- Secure and lock garage doors when you are not in or within visible sign of the garage.
- Ensure the garage has proper lighting if used as an entrance into the home.

#### **Windows**

- Installing impact resistant glass with protective covering can help reduce windows being smashed.
- Auxiliary locking systems can help prevent windows from being pried open.
- Use curtains or blinds to keep persons from looking into your home.

#### **Going on Vacation**

- Leave your key with a close friend, or family member so they can keep watch over your neighborhood.
- Try leaving at least one light on while you're away so it looks like you are there.
- Keep vacation dates off of social media.

#### **Deliveries/Repairmen**

- Don't give repairmen a key, and don't give people fixing your car your whole set of keys.
- Your house keys can be easily duplicated and your address can usually be obtained from your license plate number.
- Don't let strangers into your home. Deliverymen and people on legitimate business can always show you their ID.

MOW AND RAKE YOUR LAWN





### PTIA NEWS and NOTES

- The Amended and Restated Articles was filed and recorded on September 3, 2024.
- **Electronic copies of the Articles and our Bylaws were** mass emailed to all residents.
- On August 15, 2024 BREC Representatives met with residents who live on the West side of Ector to assess property that is butted up against the Park. The concerns are overgrown bushes and/or dead trees that impose on residential property. Once assessments are complete a report will be issued to President Miller.
- Officer on Patrol Signage will be placed on the back of several stop signs in an effort to deter thieves/ burglars.
- Neighborhood Canvas Beginning Monday, November 11, 2024, members of the ACC and Compliance Committees will conduct a canvas of all properties, specifically those that are not in compliance with the following:
  - 1) bushes that are overgrown up to the eaves on
  - 2) bushes that obstruct windows and/or entrances to your home
  - 3) bushes or crepe myrtle trees that obstruct the sidewalk or are overhanging in the street

Dry trees can burn faster than newspaper. They can be completely covered in flames in seconds. \* Ladders - Heed warnings on ladders. Tens of thousands of people are treated for injuries related to ladder falls in November and December. Cords - Always look for the marking of a recognized testing lab. Don't overload extension cords and power strips. Holiday Lights - Prevent fires and shock. Throw out damaged or frayed light sets. Candles - Be careful with candle placement. Candle fires cause millions of dollars of property damage each year. Decorations - Avoid sharp, breakable decorations in homes with young children.
